Though in its seedling year, the folks of The Wildwood Flower in Rochester, VT do," says Jake Murrow, "and that makes a difference."

Owner and operator Mary Atwood is excited to be working with a family team to get the store in high spirits and ready for high summer, while the weather outside does its own work to coax people out-of-doors.

The store is home to a mix of antiques, handmade crafts, jewelry, musical instruments, artwork, a full candy-shop display, and a large collection of curiosities. Highlights include Bob Atwood's superbly restored Hoosier cabinets, which were found in any well-kept kitchen at the turn of the century and on into the '40s, Mary and Bonnie Atwood's "made right at the store" craft items, jewelry, and artwork, Jake Murrow's restored vintage musical instruments, as well as a growing selection of other items made by local crafts-people.

"It's a great opportunity for all of us to do what we like to do," says Jake, "being able to repair and restore old banjos, guitars, and mandolins as a full-time job is very much my dream." And it shows. He has a regularly rotating rack of instruments mostly ranging in age from the mid-1800s to the early 1930s. "The craftsmanship and quality of those turn of the century instruments is what makes me want to make them shining and playable again. They're beautiful." Unlike a lot of vintage shops, Jake takes apart each instrument, carefully repairs any damage and restores their parts and finish, and sets them up to play as well as they can. "I hate to see an instrument suffering from lack of care," he says.

Equally beautiful are Bob's Hoosier cabinets. They have self-contained flour sifters, are hopeful. "We're doing what we love to sugar bins, cutting boards, storage for all of your bowls, pots, pans, recipe wheels for every season, and a host of other interesting kitchen innovations which have been lost to the modern bakers and cooks. Each one has either an enamel or zinc work surface, which greatly helps for rolling dough, and they are built to roll and come apart for easy moving. He has been restoring them for twenty years and his skill shows in the work he does. When he restores a Hoosier, his finish matches to a 'T' the tone of original Hoosier finishes, and because he has been in the business so long, he almost entirely uses original parts, which is a boon to collectors.

There are objects of interest in the shop for everyone. Everywhere you turn something will catch your eye, whether you be eighty-five or eight-and-a-half.
